Only One Petition Filed For School Board Post

Florence M. Vetter, whose post on the Galesburg-Augusta School Board expires this year, will seek re-election, and her name will be the only one on the ballot. No one else filed a petition.

The school board Monday night approved a resolution to hold the annual meeting on June 10.

In other action, the board approved a request to spend \$2,000 on band instruments and an expenditure of about \$2,900 for two lathes and a scroll saw.

The Miller Co. of Grand Rapids was low bidder for a riding lawn mower (\$2,417).

The school's financial audit for 1974-'75 will again be prepared by Siegfried, Crandall, Vos and Egly of Kalamazoo. It is understood that the cost will not be more than \$1,700.

The board renewed its contract with the Regional Enrichment Center which will provide instructional materials for \$1.87 per enrolled child.

The board decided to hire a half-time custodian to care for the grounds and for lawn maintenance.

John Gladysz Receives Ph.D Degree In California

John Gladysz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Gladysz, 275 W. Michigan, Galesburg, received his Departmental Ph.D. degree from Stanford University Friday, May 17. The degree will be conferred in ceremonies June 16. John was graduated from Gales-

burg, where he was studying the action of the reactive organometallic compound titanocene on oxygenated organic molecules. In Part II, a new understanding of the biological nitrogen fixation process was achieved by use of model compounds.

The evening program included dinner at Inman's Restaurant.

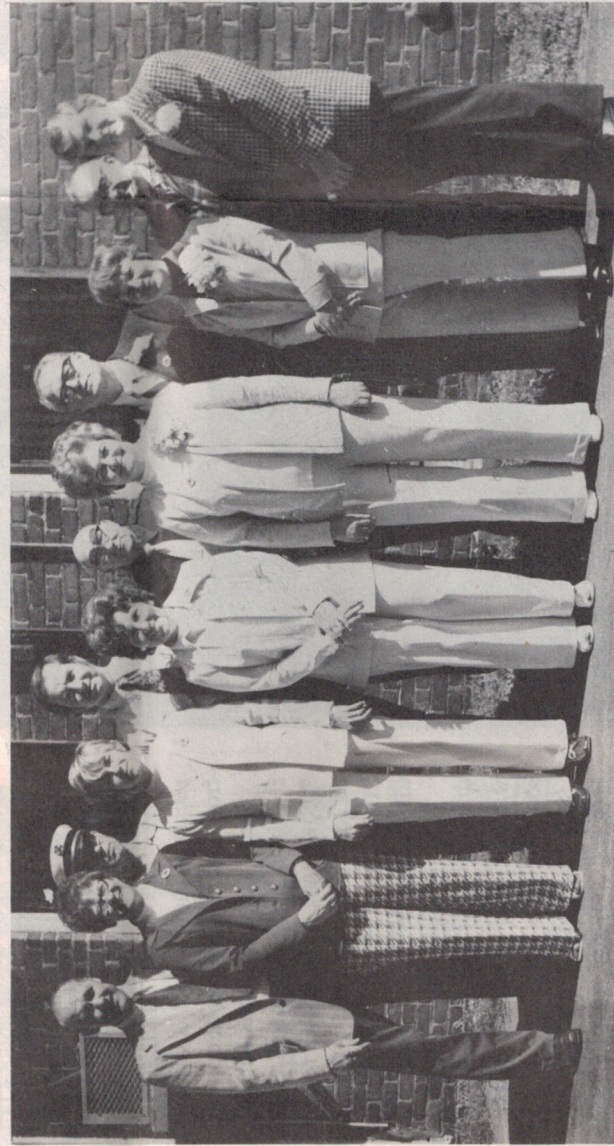
Robert Adams, attorney with the Doerr-Doerr & Adams, P. C., law firm, Galesburg, gave a history of Galesburg. He traced events beginning with the Potawatomi tribe of the Algonquin Indian nation. Their "highway" was the Kalamazoo River.

Isaac Toland was one of the first permanent settlers. He came in 1829, built a log cabin, planted a crop of winter wheat and returned to Ypsilanti for the winter. The family returned the next

spring and stayed.

The first frame house was built here in 1836, the same year that George Gale came floating down the river in a flat-bottomed boat. He was impressed with the water power potential. He laid out plans for a city with the idea for the five corners. He dug a mill race and the foundation for a mill in the general area of where Galesburg Mfg. stands. The mill race ran through town. He ran short of money and sold it, moving to California. Meanwhile the citizens decided the town should be

his class. He attended Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo, from June, 1968 to August, 1969. In September, 1969, he entered the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, where he was affiliated with Phi Beta Kappa, and earned his B. S. degree in Chemistry. Gladysz was graduated from the U of M with high distinction and highest honors in April, 1971.

John entered Stanford in September, 1971 on a National Science Foundation Fellowship, and was a teaching assistant for undergraduate courses.

His grade point average was 4.00 (all A's) in high school, undergraduate and graduate school. His dissertation title was "I. Titanocene Induced Reductive Degradations of Organic Compounds; II. Iron-Molybdenum Models for Nitrogenase." His research advisor was Professor E. E. van Tamelen.

In Part I, several unprecedented transformations, of potential use in natural and medicinal product

by appropriate addition of iron-

sulfur and molybdenum components, the biological reaction was duplicated under mild conditions in a test tube. All protein and nitrogenous foods are produced via the nitrogenase enzyme, and these studies suggest new ways in which nitrogen from the air might be converted to these commercially important products. To date, this work has resulted in three publications in the Journal of the American Chemical Society and has been presented at two international symposia.

On July 1, Gladysz will begin his duties as Assistant Professor of Chemistry at UCLA, ranked among the top 10 chemistry departments in the United States. His duties will consist of teaching at the graduate and undergraduate levels and initiating several research programs in the areas of organometallic and heteroatom chemistry, with emphasis on developing new, more convenient methods for the synthesis of medicinal and biologically active products.
